Politics (Greek: Πολιτικά, Polittiká) is a work of political philosophy by Aristotle, a 4th-century BC Greek philosopher.. The end of the Nicomachean Ethics declared that the inquiry into ethics necessarily follows into politics, and the two works are frequently considered to be parts of a larger treatise—or perhaps connected lectures—dealing with the "philosophy of human affairs".

The English politics has its roots in the name of Aristotle's classic work, Polittiká, which introduced the Greek term polittiká (Πολιτικά, 'affairs of the cities'). In the mid-15th century, Aristotle's composition would be rendered in Early Modern English as Polettiques , which would become Politics in Modern English.

Aristotle posits the existence of natural slaves, "those who are as different [from other men] as the soul from the body or man from the beast,... who [participate] in reason only to the extent of perceiving it, but [do] not have it."
