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Bebop Scales Jazz Scales And

The bebop scales are frequently used in jazz improvisation and are derived from the modes of the major scale, the melodic minor scale, and the harmonic minor scale. According to Corey Christiansen, "David Baker, one of the world's finest jazz educators, named these scales the 'bebop scales' because they were used so often by jazz artists from the Bebop Era. These artists include Charlie Christian, Charlie Parker, Lester Young, and Dizzy Gillespie, to name a few." There are five types of frequent

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Bebop Scales -- Jazz Scales & Patterns in All 12 Keys ...

In this 5 minute masterclass we're going to talk about bebop scales. Bebop scales are scales that derive from the bebop language, adding an extra chromatic note to a basic major, minor or dominant scale. This extra note is very useful as it will help to create logical phrases with 4 or 8 notes.

The chord/scale relationships of the bebop scales are self-explanatory. They're in the names. The tonic of each scale is the same as the tonic of the corresponding chord. The C bebop scale works over a C7 (or C9 or C13) chord; the C major bebop scale works over a Cmaj7 (or Cmaj9 or C or C6) chord.

Jazz Scales: The Bebop Scale

Bebop scales were 'created' (or at least 'named') by a Jazz composer called David Baker. He called them this because he noticed many Jazz musicians from the Bebop Era (Charlie Parker, Dizzy Gillespie, Charlie Christian, Bud Powell, etc.) inserted an extra chromatic passing note when playing scalar runs.

The bebop scale is a dominant scale and has the same function in a key as the Mixolydian scale. Here is how the bebop scale is usually applied: On dominant chords: the bebop scale is used to play over dominant chords, such as the 5 in a 2-5-1 progression or the dominant 7 chords in a jazz blues progression.

The other bebop scale that you need to know is the major bebop scale. The b6 is an effective passing tone to add melodic motion to your solos over major or dominant chords. The addition of the b6 creates natural voice leading within the scale that lends a melodic character:

Bebop scales appear to have emerged as a theoretical concept in the first few decades after the emergence of bebop as a distinct jazz style, which occurred around the time of the Second World War in the late 1930s/early 1940s.

Bebop Scales. The bebop scales are mostly used in jazz. You will probably notice the close relationship between the Bebop Scale and the Major Scale. The only difference is one extra note, this can be compared with the blue note added to a Pentatonic to get a blues scale. Although we don't call it a blue note in this case, but a passing tone. As the pictures below show, the passing note can be found between the 5th and 6th note in the scale.

Piano Bebop Scale - overview with pictures

Jazz improvisers, particularly bassist and guitarist, use these scales in a number of interesting ways. For example, over B \flat maj 7#11, one can use a major pentatonic based on the 2nd scale degree of B \flat (C-D-E-G-A) to imply 9-3- # 11-13-7, respectively.

Why Bebop Scales? Well, at some point in their development, jazz improvisers usually get tired of fitting the right scales over chords, like Dorian, Mixolydian, and major scales, and you long for a more chromatic approach to soloing.

Jazz Scales - Bebop Scales

As the Mixolydian and Dorian bebop scales contain identical notes, the same scale can be used across a IIm7-V7-I sequence, as with the modal method (chapter 5). The bebop scale leads nicely to the 3rd of the repeated IIm7 to end up with a very satisfying jazz (bebop) style. (Ex 11c) ex 11c: Bebop scale covering a repeated IIm7-V7 progression.

First of all, there isn't just one so-called Bebop Scale, but a large number of them-- in fact, what we call "BeBop Scales" is actually a concept, and not a particular scale. Basically, the idea is that we can insert a extra note into an already existing scale. That extra note will be a passing tone. Let's take a C Major scale as an example:

In other words, the two Bebop scales (dominant and major) together represent two alterations: diminished fifth and augmented fifth, in relation to the tonic. How to use the Bebop Scale Well, the Bebop scale can be used in any tonal context, as long as those alterations on the fifth serve as passing notes!

As you can begin to "feel" the diagonal scales under your fingers you will develop hearing instincts. Especially with the bebop scale. When assimilated those jazz guitar scales help in developing a natural and instinctive improvisational voice. The hearing part of it comes mostly from the sameness of fingerings on each octave.

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
