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The least serious fractures usually require only a cast or a splint. If the fracture crosses the growth plate or goes into the joint and is not well-aligned, surgery may be necessary. Growth plates that are surgically realigned may have a better chance of recovering and growing again than do growth plates that are left in a poor position.

A fracture at one of the ends of a long bone in a growing child

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involving its growth plate is known as an epiphyseal fracture. Disks of cartilage near each end of an immature long bone allow the bone to grow. These areas of growing tissue, known as epiphyseal plates, harden as a child matures to adulthood.

After Trauma: Growth Plate Fractures Growth plates, also known as epiphyseal plate or physis, are the area of growing tissue near the end of the long bones in children and adolescents. Located at each end of a bone, growth plates are the weakest sections of the skeleton — sometimes even weaker than surrounding ligaments and tendons.

Growth plate fractures are often caused by a single event, such as a fall or car accident. They can also occur gradually as a result of repetitive stress on the bone, which may occur when a child overtrains in a sports activity.

Injuries to the growth plate are fractures. They comprise 15 percent of all childhood fractures. They occur twice as often in boys as in girls, with the greatest incidence among 14- to 16-year-old boys and 11- to 13-year-old girls. Older girls experience these fractures less often because their bodies mature at an earlier age than boys.

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Growth Plate Fractures and Injuries: Get the Facts

Salter-Harris fractures are fractures involving epiphyseal plates and hence tend to interfere with growth, height or physiologic functions. Osgood-Schlatter disease results from stress on the epiphyseal plate in the tibia, leading to excess bone growth and a painful lump at the knee.

Most growth plate fractures happen from falling or twisting. Contact sports (like football or basketball) or fast-moving activities (like skiing, skateboarding, sledding, or biking) are common causes. Growth plate fractures are suspected in children who have tenderness and swelling localized over the growth plate or who cannot move or put weight on the affected limb. Plain x-rays are the diagnostic test of choice. If findings are equivocal, opposite-side comparison x-rays may be helpful.

A Salter-Harris fracture is a fracture that involves the epiphyseal plate or growth plate of a bone, specifically the zone of provisional calcification. It is thus a form of child bone fracture. It

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is a common injury found in children, occurring in 15% of childhood long bone fractures.

The key difference between the child's bone and that of an adult is the presence of a physis. Physeal injuries are very common in children, making up 15-30% of all bony injuries. The growth plate, or physis, is the translucent, cartilaginous disc separating the epiphysis from the metaphysis and is responsible for longitudinal growth of long bones.

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Fracture Education : Physeal (growth plate) injuries

Fractures most commonly occur through zone of provisional calcification ; Primary spongiosa (E) (metaphysis) Vascular invasion and resorption of transverse septa. Osteoblasts align on cartilage bars produced by physeal expansion.

Fractures may be classified into six types based on Salter-Harris fractures classification: Type I - A transverse fracture through the growth plate (also referred to as the "physis") : 6% incidence; Type II - A fracture through the growth plate and the metaphysis, sparing the epiphysis: 75% incidence; Type III - A fracture through growth plate and epiphysis, sparing the metaphysis: 8 ...

Salter Harris Classification of Fractures - MedWorldOnline

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Intraarticular Fracture extending completely through Growth Plate and out of metaphysis From joint through epiphysis, physis, and out through metaphysis Needs perfect reduction (often open reduction is required) Poor prognosis, lost blood supply and high risk of growth failure (especially femur or tibia)

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
